14NPOO97 - Forestry Determination in respect of proposed brash mats roads approx 1150 metres in length to facilitate timber extraction at Hesleyside Hall, Bellingham, Hexham, Northumberland, NE48 2LA

Thank you for consulting me on the above application. I wish to make the following comments on the potential landscape, lighting and tree implications associated with this proposed development.

- I can confirm that I do not believe that the proposed development will have a significant effect upon the landscape character or views of this part of Northumberland National Park. The nearest publicly accessible receptor site is the minor county road between Bellingham and Low Greystead and limited views of the tracks will be gained from this road. It is my understanding that the forest tracks are being upgraded and installed in order to proactively manage the woodland found on the Hesleyside estate and this is particularly welcomed. The removal of the conifer plantation and replacement with native broadleaved species in line with the heritage management plan will in the long-term have a significant beneficial effect upon the landscape character and views for this part of the National Park.
- There are no new external lighting implications resulting from this application thus the dark skies status of the National Park should not be threatened by an increase in light pollution as a result of this proposed development.
- I understand that work on site involves maintenance to existing forest tracks and the topping up of the surface of these with crushed stone. This work should not affect any notable trees as it is utilising an existing track through the woodland, although much of this woodland is designated a site of special scientific interest and liaison with Natural England will be necessary. The other element of the work involves the creation of temporary brash mats routes that will be removed after harvesting. It is good forestry practice to utilise such roads as indicated within the UK Forestry Standard in order to protect soil structure and prevent undesirable soil loss and siltation of nearby watercourses as a result of the harvesting machinery. The brash mat routes are to be created through areas of conifer plantation that is being extracted and thus notable trees are unlikely to be affected as a result of this activity.

I have no objections to this work proceeding as set out within the application and in time there should be a positive landscape effect resulting from the activity associated with this work.
