Under the above Act, Northumberland National Park Authority hereby grants planning permission for:

Demolition of existing hay shed and erection of new general purpose agricultural building. at Land north west of Hethpool Cottages, Kirknewton, Wooler, Northumberland, NE71 6TW.

as described in application reference **20NP0035** and in the plans and drawings attached to it, subject to the following conditions:

1. The development hereby permitted shall be begun before the expiration of three years from the date of this permission.

Reason: To ensure that the development is commenced within a reasonable period of time from the date of this permission, as required by Section 91 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 (as amended by Section 51 of the Planning and Compulsory Purchase Act 2004).

2. The development hereby permitted shall be carried out in accordance with the following approved plans and documents:

- Application form received 10th June 2020;
- Location Plan Dwg. no 5251 / 20 /B received 15th October 2020;
- Existing Site Plan Dwg. No 5251 / 21 received 10th June 2020;
- Proposed Site Plan (A1) Dwg no 5251 / A1 / 22 / C received 15th October 2020;
- Planning Drawing, Dwg. no 5251 / 23 received 10th June 2020;
- New Agricultural Shed at Hethpool Farm, College Valley Estates, May 2020, George Dodds, received 10th June 2020;
- Heritage, Design and Access Statement, Revision A, November 2020, Proposed new general purpose shed at Hethpool, College Valley,

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Kirknewton, Wooler, NE71 6TW, Savills, received 10th November 2020;

- Planning Supporting Statement, Savills, November 2020, received 10th November 2020;
- Correspondence from Stephen Crees, College Valley Estates Ltd., Dated 5th November 2020 in respect of retention of woodland cover, received 10th November 2020;
- Woodland Screening, Dwg no 5251 /24/ A received 10th November 2020;

Reason: For the avoidance of doubt, to enable the local planning authority to adequately manage the development and to ensure the proposal accords with policies ST1, S2, ST4, DM7, DM8, DM10, DM11, DM12, DM14 and DM15 of the Northumberland National Park Local Plan and the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF).

3. Prior to the fixing of any external lighting associated with the development, details of the external lighting shall be submitted to and agreed in writing with the Local Planning Authority. Details should include:

- The specific location of all external lighting units;
- Design of all lighting units;
- Details of beam orientation and lux levels; and
- Any proposed measures such as motion sensors and timers that will be used on lighting units.

The approved lighting scheme shall be installed in accordance with the approved details and shall be maintained as such during the operation of the development, unless removed.

Reason: In order to ensure that there is no harmful impact upon the tranquility and intrinsically dark character of Northumberland National Park and the Northumberland International Dark Sky Park through excessive light pollution, in accordance with policy DM11 of the Northumberland National Park Local Plan and paragraph 180 of the NPPF.

4. In accordance with the recommendations detailed in Section 6 of the 'George Dodds, New Agricultural Shed at Hethpool Farm, College Valley Estates, May 2020' Report, prior to first use, a barn owl box shall be installed in the building hereby approved.

Reason: To provide a local biodiversity enhancement in accordance with the requirements of Local Plan policy DM10 and the NPPF.

5. The woodland compartments shown on Drawing no 5251 / 24 / A shall be maintained as continuous woodland cover for the lifetime of the development



hereby permitted and no management of these compartments (felling / thinning or otherwise removing trees) should be undertaken without the prior written approval of the Local Planning Authority.

Reason: For the avoidance of doubt and to ensure a woodland buffer is maintained in the interest of landscape, visual amenity and residential amenity in accordance with the requirements of Local Plan policies ST2, DM8 and DM11 and the NPPF.

6. Prior to the first use of the building hereby permitted, a landscaping scheme to include exact location, species and specifications of all trees shown on indicative plan 5251 / A1 / 22 / C, shall be submitted for approval in writing by the Local Planning Authority. The landscaping shall be carried out in full accordance with the approved details in the first planting season following the commencement of the development. Any trees which die, or are otherwise removed, within a period of five years of the completion of the development shall be replaced in the next planting season with others of a similar size and species, unless the Local Planning Authority gives written consent to any variation.

Reason: In the interests of protecting the visual character of the area and the special qualities of the National Park, in accordance with in accordance with Northumberland National Park Local Plan policies ST2, DM8 and DM11 and the NPPF.

7. The building hereby approved shall not be used for the over-wintering of cattle, except for the temporary housing of sick animals, or as necessary due to severe weather conditions which threaten the animal's lives, without the prior written approval of the Local Planning Authority

Reason: To protect the amenity of the locality, especially for people living and/or working nearby, in accordance with Local Plan policies ST2 and DM8 and the NPPF.

Informative Notes :

1. This planning permission is granted in strict accordance with the approved plans. It should be noted however that:
 - (a) Any variation from the approved plans following commencement of the development, irrespective of the degree of variation, may constitute unauthorised development and may be liable to enforcement action.
 - (b) You, your agent, or any other person responsible for implementing this permission should inform the Local Planning Authority immediately of any proposed variation from the approved plans and ask to be advised as to



the best method to resolve the matter. Most proposals for variation to the approved plans will require the submission of a new application.

2. This consent is granted subject to conditions and it is the owner and the person responsible for the implementation of the development who will be fully responsible for their compliance throughout the development and beyond. Some conditions may require work to be carried out, or details to be approved prior to the commencement of the development.

Where pre-commencement conditions are not complied with, the whole of the development could be unauthorised, and you may be liable to enforcement action. In some circumstances, the only way to rectify the situation may be through the submission of a new application. If any other type of condition is breached then you may be liable to a breach of condition notice.

3. Building materials or equipment shall not be stored on the highway unless otherwise agreed. You are advised to contact the Streetworks team on 0345 600 6400 for Skips and Containers licences.
4. In accordance with the Highways Act 1980 mud, debris or rubbish shall not be deposited on the highway

Positive and Proactive Planning Statement

NOTES

1. If you are aggrieved by the decision of your local planning authority to refuse permission for the proposed development or to grant it subject to conditions, then you can appeal to the Secretary of State under section 78 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 or Section 20 of the Planning (Listed Buildings and Conservation Areas) Act 1990). If you want to appeal against your Local Planning Authority's decision then you must do so within 6 months of the date of this notice (subject to the additional provisions below).
2. If this is a decision to refuse planning permission for a householder application or for a minor commercial application or to grant it subject to conditions, if you want to appeal against your Local Planning Authority's decision then you must do so within 12 weeks of the date of this notice. This process does not apply to any decision in circumstances where an appeal against the refusal to grant listed building consent is submitted at the same time as an appeal against the refusal to grant planning permission.
3. If this is a decision to refuse advertisement consent or to grant it subject to conditions, if you want to appeal against your Local Planning Authority's decision then you must do so within 8 weeks of the date of this notice.
4. If this decision relates to the same or substantially the same land and development as is or subsequently becomes the subject of an enforcement notice, if you want to appeal against your Local Planning Authority's decision on your application, then you must do so within 28 days of the date of this notice, or within 6 months (12 weeks in the case of a householder or minor commercial appeal) of the date of this notice whichever period expires sooner.

6. The Secretary of State has power to allow a longer period for the giving of a notice of appeal but they will not normally be prepared to exercise this power unless there are special circumstances which excuse the delay in giving notice of appeal. The Secretary of State is not, however, required to entertain such an appeal if it appears to them that permission for the proposed development could not have been granted by the Local Planning Authority, or could not have been so granted otherwise than subject to the conditions imposed by them, having regard to the statutory requirements, to the provisions of the development order and to any directions given under the order.
7. Please note that only the applicant has the right to appeal. Third parties have no right to appeal against a planning decision.



8. If permission to develop land is refused, or granted subject to conditions, whether by the Local Planning Authority or by the Secretary of State, and the owner of the land claims that the land has become incapable of reasonably beneficial use in its existing state and cannot be rendered capable of reasonably beneficial use by the carrying out of any development which has been or would be permitted, he or she may serve on the Council within the boundaries of which the land is situated, a purchase notice requiring that Council to purchase his interest in the land in accordance with the provisions of Part VI of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 and Sections 32-37 of the Planning (Listed Buildings and Conservation Areas) Act 1990).
